
## History of original corner establishment:

A fir post 4 ft. long, 4" square, set 18" in the ground with mound of stone, scribed E. 1—563, whence the \$\frac{1}{4}\$ Sec. Cor. on west boundary of Sec. 10 T. 10 S., R. 35 E., W. M., bears N. 170 15' W. 659.44 ft. A black pine 4" diam. bears N. 420 12' E. 36.75 ft. A black pine 8" diam. bears S. 100 04' E. 16.06 ft. each blazed and scribed B.T. E. 1—563.



## Description of corner evidence found:

The corner had been distrubed by what appeared to be a hunter making a campfire ring with the rocks from the mound. A portion of the original 4x4 post was found. The two lodgepole pine BT's have grown to be 8" and 12" respectfully and are in fair condition.

Description of monument and accessories I established to perpetuate the original location of this corner

With the aid of the BT's the corner was restored. Set a 2" aluminum cap on a 1"x30" galvanized pipe, which is split for 8", in the center of a rock mound about 2' in diameter and 1' high. Bearing Tree tags were attached to each BT with the information listed above for each tree. This corner is very near the proposed centerline of the Whitney-Greenhorn road and may be obliterated guring construction if extreme care is not taken.
